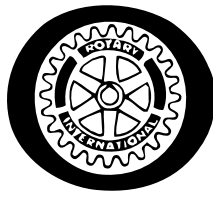

He would like to visit a mental health institution, an aged care facility, a service provider for people with intellectual disabilities, and vocational/recreation programs for people with disabilities.

Rotary District 5870 Conference coming up in May

The 2007 District 5870 Conference will be held on the Carnival Cruise Lines "Ecstasy" departing from Galveston at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 10, 2007. The ship will sail to Cozumel, Mexico before returning to Galveston at 8:00 a.m. on Monday, May 14, 2007.

The District has reserved 150 cabins at this time. Rates begin at \$325 per person, double occupancy plus taxes and fees for inside cabins. Outside cabins begin at \$380 per person, double occupancy plus taxes and fees. Once the initial 150 cabins are sold, a second group of cabins will be available, but the rates will be higher. Conference registration will not include shipboard accommodations.

In 1960, Jack moved to Beaumont to be City Manager, returning to Waco in 1962 when he was named a vice president of The Citizens National Bank of Waco. He reentered the club with the classification of BANKING. He was elected to the club's Board of Directors first in 1971, and served six different terms as a director. During 1972-73, he served as Secretary-Treasurer, Chairman of the Program Committee

The next time someone asks you "What's your business?" tell them what it is. Then tell them that you represent your vocation in your Rotary Club. That immediately tells them something positive and important about you!

Rotary Membership dues for the 4/1/07-9/30/07 period are now due, and you will note that a \$50 voluntary tax-deductible contribution payable to The Rotary Foundation is included on the invoice.

During its Centennial year, Rotary International asked all Rotarians to participate in its "Every Rotarian - \$100 - Every Year" plan for The Rotary Foundation. Attendance -- not a "dash in" and "dash out" habit -- but a minimum of 60% of each week's meeting is the price of Rotary membership. Anything less, according to Rotary International's requirements, cannot be counted for attendance credit.
